The joint program offerings are for Certificate in Pastoral Leadership, Diploma in Pastoral Leadership and Master's Degree in Development Leadership. They will be implemented by the XU College of Arts and Sciences, and the XU Graduate School.

IFFAsia is a school of Discipleship and Mission for young adults and laity in Asia based in Quezon City. IFF Asia and XU's collaborative programs recognize the ability of young adults to engage in mission and projects of personal, communal and ecclesiastical order to become actors of positive change in society.

The program aims to strengthen and expand mutual contacts between the universities, and to enable cooperation and exchange between students, specifically in the field of agriculture. Selected students will have the privilege of studying at UHH while paying XU tuition rates.



Students who wish to apply should have a minimum QPI of 3.00. A selection committee from the College of Agriculture will screen all applicants for recommendation to UHH,

which will make the final admission decision. Accepted students will take care of accommodation, transportation, health insurance and medical costs.

# XU admin undergo special management training

ith the new challenges for higher education and the new k-12 curriculum looming, the Human Resources Office organized a top-down leadership seminar dubbed, "I-LEAD," starting with the first liner administrators. Its first installment was a two-day workshop on the balanced scorecard approach to strategic planning as well as budgeting and finances on November 9 and 10.

The said training aimed to expound on the university goals and to equip administrators with management skills to align their respective unit's goals with these using the balanced scorecard approach.

The seminar-workshop was attended by the University President Fr Roberto Yap SJ, together with his vice presidents, the college deans and the unit heads. Fr Yap shared that the university is moving toward exploring strategic options in carrying out the k-12 program for basic education. He also noted the importance of continuous learning for the administration, strengthening of the leadership bench, and bolstering of research to maintain the autonomous status of the university.

Engr Gerardo S Doroja, associate professor and dean of the College of Computer Studies, facilitated the first day of the seminar. His roadmap covered the context for strategic planning, concepts and terminologies, and the process and the tools of a balanced scorecard. He concluded his talk with a workshop.

The balanced scorecard is a tool for strategic management, communication, and performance measurement. Doroja pointed out that in translating the university's vision and strategies, administrators have to consider four perspectives: (1) customer, (2) internal business process, (3) learning and growth, and (4) financial perspective. Efforts should be tailor-fitted to focus on factors that create long term value. According to Doroja, a highly successful balanced scorecard should have leadership from the top, make strategy everyone's job, unlock and focus on hidden assets, and make strategy a continuous process. He added that managing strategy includes four processes, namely translating the vision, communicating and linking, business planning, and feedback and learning. Doroja likened strategic planning and execution to a relay race where the baton grows bigger as it is passed from one runner to the next.

A workshop on budgeting and financial management facilitated by University Treasurer Lennie Ong occupied the whole of the second day. The eagerness and the level of participation revealed how the topic cuts across disciplines and concerns.

Ms Ong emphasized that administrators should be good financial managers. She challenged the first liners to not just distribute budget but, more importantly, grow the value of what's available. She then provided the group with practical steps on how to lead and how to get started. Ong cited the quote that being a leader is not about being nice, but rather it is about being right and being strong. She said that the guiding principle in accepting or rejecting budget proposals lies on the results and cost benefit analysis, where benefits should preferrably outweigh the cost. She stressed that the burden of justifying the cost lies on the unit head. Thus, every unit head should know his or her numbers, how much has been spent and how much has been saved, among others.

# Obama wins XU mock polls

S President Barack Obama swept to re-election victory in the mock elections at Xavier University on Nov 7. Obama won by a whopping 703 votes over contender former Massachusetts Gov Mitt Romney who garnered only 403 votes. The results replicated the turnout of the actual US elections.

The activity, which was participated in by students of XU and Liceo de Cagayan University, was part of the election watch organized by the US Embassy in partnership with XU through the History/International Studies/ Political Science Department and the American Corner.

"Our goal is to raise students' awareness on the need to cast their votes based on issues and not merely on political affiliation," said Dr Roel Absin, chairperson of the History/IS/ Political Science department.

A live feed of CNN's election coverage was also shown while US Embassy officials shed light on the US electoral system. Days before, mock debates were held at XU and Liceo de Cagayan University.

Other than at XU, mock elections were also held in 14 other universities in the country with an American Corner, and, also, in shopping malls in Manila and Cebu.

# Student leaders undergo immersion

wenty-six student leaders, mostly NSTP leaders and KKP volunteers, spent their semestral break nontraditionally by participating in a 6-Day Immersion program from October 15-20. The Immersion, themed "Faith that does Justice," aimed to integrate student leaders into the grassroots of society. Through the experience, they were able to gain a wider perspective and deeper understanding of social situations, become aware of the personal call to a better life and better society, developed a strengthened commitment to serve, especially the poor and the marginalized, and promoted justice as manifestation of faith.

The Immersion Program was divided into three parts: Orientation Seminar, Immersion Proper, and Synthesis Seminar. Prior to the Immersion proper, students were oriented on Personal Values and Principles inspired by the life and teachings of Ignatius Loyola, Transcendental Purpose in the light of the First Principle and Foundation, and the different non-government organizations, such as the International Organization for Migration (IOM), Oro Habitat for Humanity (OHH), Group Foundation, Samdhana Institute, and Balaod Mindanao.

Student leaders were then immersed in the two communities, Lumbia and Macasandig, where XU's Child Fund Japan Sponsorship Project is being implemented. They were hosted by households where XU's sponsored children live. After being with their foster families, student leaders' experiences were processed in the light of Social Spirituality inspired by the Catholic Social Teachings and Pedro Arrupe's call for "Faith that does Justice."XU's five thematic agenda and the agenda's operation were presented for the student leaders to engage in. Lastly, the participants were challenged to use their education as a tool for social iustice.

"The immersion was a worthwhile experience. I thought I would just learn from lectures, seminars, workshops and activities but, no, one has to experience it. One has to live it. Though the immersion experience left me yearning for more, the experience taught me important things which I will carry onwards – my own mission in life," reflects Jason M Madronero, BSEd 3.

The Student Leaders' Immersion Program is a yearly activity organized by the Kristohanong Katilingban sa Pagpakabana – Social Involvement Office (KKP-SIO) and is coordinated by Ms Victoria Melissa C Pulido.

he Jose Chaves Alvarez Technology Complex, the new home of the Center for Integrated Technologies (CIT), has formally opened its doors to students.

The two-building complex built through the generosity of Jose Ch Alvarez, chairman of Asian Carmakers Corporation (ACC) and an XU alumnus, is a modern campus with classrooms and laboratory facilities that ensure students' quality learning. It has a rainwater catchment and a good lighting design consistent with the Green Campus Agenda of the University.

XU President Fr Roberto Yap SJ conveyed during the blessing of the building on Dec 8 that the new JCA Technology Complex is part of the expansion plan of the University in Manresa.

"Xavier continues to grow from strength to strength," said Fr Yap. "With the resources and facilities of the JCA Technology Complex, we are ready to produce the best technicians."

Fr Yap also said that the new building is a conspicuous start to achieving the objectives of XU in relation to the new K-to-12 curriculum. He bared the plans of the University to establish a senior high school with different specializations, one of them being vocational-technical. "If we are to grow and industrialize as a country, we need very good technicians," the President said, underscoring the important role of voc-tech graduates to national development.

CIT currently has courses in Mechanical Technology, Electronics and Computer Technology, Industrial Electronics Technology and Automotive Technology.

Alvarez, for his part, imparted some pearls of wisdom to the Center's more than 400 students. Speaking from experience, he told them, "Do not to be discouraged by the absence of money in your pocket. Learning can be acquired by going to school and working at the same time."

The chairman of ACC, the official distributor of BMW cars in the Philippines, further delighted the students with his offer for them to train with BMW. The Complex, in fact, has a BMW laboratory, and the brand's dealership office is located right across the Complex.

"I hope the Complex will provide you the basic knowledge to upgrade yourself," he remarked. "We will continue to assist you."

Although Alvarez assured the students that





success is highly achievable through hard work, he also reminded them of something much greater:

"You can aspire for much knowledge and wealth, but remember you are products of Xavier. What you should never forget is the power of prayer." Vews

# M'nao leaders mull mining control

eaders from about 30 government and non-government organizations, people's organizations, church groups, the media and the academe in Mindanao came together for the Mindanao Leaders Summit on Oct 6 to discuss recent mining issues and the development of an Alternative Minerals Management Bill.

The invited speakers were Gerry Arances of Legal Rights and Natural Resources Center Inc - Kasama sa Kalikasan (LRC-KsK) who shared about LRC-KsK's ongoing anti-mining campaign in Congress, Cagayan de Oro 1<sup>st</sup> District Rep Rufus Rodriguez who talked about the CDO Watershed Bill, BAYAN MUNA Rep Teddy Casiño who discussed the Consolidated Bill and its prospects, and, on behalf of Rep Arlene Bag-ao, Atty Jan Perry Eugenio who elaborated on the Alternative Minerals Management Bill. Archdiocese of Cagayan de Oro, Philippine Misereor Partnership Incorporated - Mindanao, Samdhana Institute, XU Center for Legal Assistance, SOS – Yamang Bayan Network, and the Legal Rights and Natural Resources Center, Inc.-Kasama sa Kalikasan/Friends of the Earth-Philippines.

Archbishop Antonio Ledesma SJ challenged Mindanao leaders to form an independent, multi-sectoral monitoring body that will periodically examine the actual state of mining and logging activities. He also called on them to initiate a comprehensive scientific study of the river basin and watersheds, especially in Cagayan de Oro and its adjoining tributaries.

On mining, Archbp Ledesma urged our leaders to broaden the meaning of "free, prior, and informed consent" and clarify the issue of environmental governance. He also exhorted them to invoke the precautionary principle, and to put the safety of the larger community first.

The Mindanao leaders, together with Archbp Ledesma, Rep Rufus Rodriguez, and Rep Teddy Casiño, signed the petition supporting the Alternative Minerals Mining Bill, making a stand for mining-affected communities, the indigenous peoples, the environment, and the present and future generations.

Xavier University, through its Research and Social Outreach units, namely the Center for Legal Assistance, Engineering Resource Center, Kinaadman Research Center, and KKP – Social Involvement Office, represented the academe.

The gathering was held at Balay Mindanao Peace Center and was organized by the Archdiocese of Cagayan de Oro, Philippine Misereor Partnership Incorporated -Mindanao, Samdhana Institute, XU Center for Legal Assistance, SOS – Yamang Bayan Network, and the LRC-KsK/Friends of the Earth-Philippines.

# NUJP-CDO holds forum on Maguindanao Massacre anniversary

t's been three years since the day when 58 people, including at least 32 journalists, were brutally murdered in Ampatuan town, Maguindanao. Deliverance of justice has been slow. No convictions have been made and 93 suspects are still at large. Making things worse was a move by the Supreme Court to ban the live coverage of the trial, blocking immediate access to new information and causing a declining interest in the case. It seems Press Freedom in the Philippines is at the mercy of both bullets and the justice system itself. Thus, the National Union of Journalists of the Philippines-Cagayan de Oro Chapter held "End Impunity Now!", an open forum emphasizing the role of journalism in ending a system that allows those who have gravely sinned to remain free. In attendance were local journalists and media practitioners and

Xavier University students, mostly from DevCom.

Starting off the forum, after the Prayer and Opening Remarks, was a film by PCIJ, "Maguindanao: The Quest for Justice". The film showcased what has been done about the case, which is, unfortunately for the relatives of victims, very little in comparison to its magnitude. After the viewing, Eduardo Montalvan, publisher and Editor-in-Chief of the Mindanao Current, took the floor to discuss how the case remains relevant until today. He stressed that these kinds of incidents breed fear that kills press freedom and the gunning down of manpower kills the media outlets themselves, which makes the fight for justice even more important in this particular case.

Atty Bobby Goking, Chairman Emeritus of NUJP-CDO, expounded on the legal perspective of the case. He also pointed out that the media is one of the four pillars of the government that serves as the watchdog of the three others, namely the Executive, Legislative, and Judiciary branches, that are equal in power but must remain separate from one other. On this note, the question of who watches the watchdog came up in the open forum that followed



after his talk. The People, of course, was the right answer.

Art Bunjoc Jr, ABS-CBN NorthMin Station Manager, discussed "Ethics of Journalism." The students actively participated when he asked for their thoughts on the negative and positive traits of the local media. Bonjoc stressed that the credibility of the media depends on its vision, mission and values. He also emphasized that media practitioners should not fight despite having differing views on particular issues.

The Chairman of NUJP-CDO, Froilan Gallardo, also took the stage to enlighten the DevCom students about the economic conditions of journalism in the Philippines. In Cagayan de Oro city, a journalism career is not very promising. There are only a few job openings but many Communication graduates. But this should not be cause for discouragement, he said.

# A Smile that sparked ripples of change

trait that Filipinos are famous for in the world is that, despite the perils and hardships in life, we are still able to smile. As proof, the New Economics Foundation's (NEF) Happy Planet Index hailed the Philippines as one of the happiest nations in the world for 2012— 25th,to be exact.

Have you asked yourself how far your smile can go? One thing's sure, a smile is contagious, enough to reach epidemic proportions, enough to ignite the spirit of volunteerism.

The Operation Smile journey of "Changing lives, one smile at a time" started 30 years ago and has grown into one of the largest volunteer-based medical charities in the world. With more than 5,000 volunteer medical professionals and a countless number of student volunteers from over 80 countries, it has provided more than 200,000 free reconstructive surgeries for children and young adults with cleft lip, cleft palate and other facial deformities in over 60 countries. Over 25,000 Filipinos have benefitted from their missions.

Operation Smile recently concluded its 30th anniversary celebration , "The Journey Home," completing a total of 1, 219 surgeries in 10 regions nationwide. Xavier University constituents answered the call for student volunteers for the November 10-16 mission and helped change the lives of 129 individuals from Northern Mindanao.

### **Crossing of paths**

CDO was not in the original list of mission sites. However, Typhoon Sendong's devastation in December 2011 (the time they were planning their celebration) prompted Operation Smile Philippines to realize they could help rebuild people's lives here.

Earlier in 2012 Operation Smile Philippines had partnered with Xavier Science Foundation, an XU support facility, to recruit daring and kind-hearted souls for their service, time, talents and skills in missions. The Foundation is attached to XU's College of Agriculture, thus, it was logical to start the volunteer enlistment from there.

XSF scholars in the Agriculture programs frontlined the event through the different committees: food, transportation, ushers, medical records, secretariat and documentation.

### **Tapping fellow Ateneans**

XSF then tapped the Philosophy Department, while the committee heads coordinated with different student organizations, the Council of Nursing Students (CONUS), the



Development Communication Society (DEVCOMSOC), Reserve Officers' Training Corps (ROTC), The Crusader Publication and many others.

"It's like a ripple effect, you start helping others and infect others to help, too," shared Zena Bernardo, OSP deputy executive director . "We want more young people to carry the torch this time."

Before the Nov 10 mission came the recruitment of fellow Ateneans, including alumni. Many did endless text brigades, tagged friends and followers on Facebook and Twitter, shared YouTube videos, and posted tarpaulins and posters. Others gathered interested individuals through casual conversations.

The OSP team arrived at dusk of November 9 and was welcomed by student volunteers with the world-famous Filipino warmth and hospitality. The students also served as local tour guides, answering questions and talking about our city and country to the mostly first-time visitors.

# XU student volunteers taking action

On mission day itself, the students arrived at the break of day with sunny smiles, bursting with excitement . They were in their designated areas when the patients from as far as Zamboanga del Sur, Gingoog City, Bukidnon and neighboring areas started to arrive. They learned to relate with fellow Ateneans to provide organized service. They learned the volunteerism maxim: "As a volunteer, it is not about you, it is about them."

They performed their tasks well – from registering patients to handing out priority numbers, from conducting initial medical interviews to ushering patients to the other stations, and even pointing out the restrooms, and teaching the foreign volunteers how to greet "Good Morning" in Visayan (and confirming that, yes, Lady Gaga is famous in the Philippines).

The language barrier was broken, thanks to our multilingual skills. Translating for the doctors and patients from English to Filipino or Visayan or Maranao, and vice-versa, was a cinch.

### Behind Rollino's smile

For students, the screening was

also a chance to feel like parents anticipating surgery for their children.

"Makulbaan pud ta ug apil [We'd get anxious as well] because, as a volunteer, you get to know their stories and reasons ngano gusto nila na maoperahan ilang anak [why they want their child to be operated on]," shared Rell Marc Maquiling, an XSF scholar and the head of ushers.

One patient from faraway Mampayag, Bukidnon was eleven-year-old "Rollino," a smart boy with dark, brown eyes. In his barangay, he was treated like a pariah. His inborn cleft lip had disfigured his whole face. Rollino frequently hides at home; when he does risk going out, wanting to play with other children his age, he is often called unpleasant names.

"Gaingnan nila siya ug pangit [They call my son ugly]," said Rollino's mother.

His age doesn't match his current educational level, as he had often stopped schooling because of the teasing and taunting.

His family brought him for







screening with hopes for Rollino to gain self-confidence and were gratifiedupon hearing his name called, knowing that the surgery would change his life.

However, there were also some disappointments. Some patients were excluded because of age or medical/health conditions like low hemoglobin count (which may cause severe bleeding), breathing problems and malnutrition. Operation Blessing, another NGO, was present to counsel those who were disqualified from the surgery.

### The long-awaited moment

Surgery started on November 12 and the tension and excitement hyped up the families at the newly-opened children's ward of the Northern Mindanao Medical Center (NMMC). It was the time they had long been waiting for .

Each single cleft operation took around 45 minutes. While the patients waited for their turn, the student volunteers embarked on one of the "most crucial" roles in the mission - entertaining the kids with toys, coloring pads, stickers, etc to divert their attention and ease the nervousness. Kids being kids – some cried, peed in their pants, ran away or were too shy to play – instant babysitters had to come to the rescue. Other students helped prepare the medical records, distributed meals and translated for doctors in the different stations, especially the Speech Therapy Training and Child Life Center. They even role-played the operation costumed with surgical caps and oxygen masks.

### Young passion

Operation Smile has grown from an NGO providing free surgeries into an institution that inspires advocacy and volunteerism among the youth.

The CDO mission also served as an avenue of cultural exposure for their two high school student volunteers, Rachel Hudspeth from New Jersey and Hayden Thompson from New Mexico. With International Student Coordinator, Amanda Bryer, they immersed themselves among families of Xavier Ecoville, the XU-led resettlement area for Typhoon Sendong survivors.

They provided basic dental health, hand washing and burncare lectures to Ecoville children and in the House of Hope, an

institution located in Lumbia for mentally-challenged patients . Their Philippine trip was topped with jeepney and motorela rides, and, of course, the usual tourist dare, with partaking of *balut*.

Alongside the volunteer medical professionals, the student volunteers experienced "renewed empowerment and the drive to create change in their community and the world."

Operation Smile and the mission experience enabled the XU student volunteers to realize that learning also comes from service. Furthermore, seeing the children smiling after the operation served as their greatest prize.

# Lessons Learned

agayan de Oro witnessed nature's wrath when Sendong struck the city on the evening of December 16, 2011. Many lives were lost while thousands went missing as rushing waters flooded the city. But before the commemoration of the tragic flood that happened a year ago, another super typhoon hit the city–Pablo (Bopha).

On December 3, 2012, Fr Bobby Yap, through the Research and Social Outreach (RSO) Cluster led by Dr Hilly Ann Roa-Quiaoit, immediately responded to the need of the city. People in Cagayan de Oro living in precarious areas had started evacuating their homes and XU generously opened the gates of its three campuses as evacuation centers. The Main, Manresa and Pueblo campuses served as temporary shelters to many Kagay-anons in the midst of the typhoon.

The Engineering Resource Center, led by Engr Dexter Lo, also provided relevant information and updates on the development of Super Typhoon Pablo. Lo and his staff religiously monitored Pablo's movements and the amount of rainfall through PAGASA's Project Noah.

The Kristohanong Katilingban sa Pagpakabana – Social Involvement Office (KKP-SIO) maximized all means of communications, especially the social media, in disseminating timely updates and in calling for people to be prepared for the possible impact of Pablo. KKP-SIO streamlined information and simplified weather updates for easy understanding by the community. As KKP has a long history of relief work dating back to the '80s, the Office spearheaded a quick response mechanism to provide assistance to those that were affected by the flooding here in Cagayan de Oro and in Compostela Valley, which was badly hit by the typhoon. KKP organized a fund drive for the victims of Pablo in the said province. Funds raised from the drive were contributed to the relief efforts of Ateneo de Davao University. The University Christmas party was also toned down in favor of donations for the disaster victims.

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Prior to Pablo and learning from the lessons of Sendong, XU had begun its advocacy on disaster preparedness. It is active in assisting communities that are highly vulnerable to flooding. Key units in the RSO have gathered their experts to help capacitate communities and assist the local government units in strengthening their Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Committees.

The University, through the RSO, has assisted 36 riverside barangays in Cagayan de Oro City. The Engineering Resource Center, with its expertise and various researches, was able to provide scientific grounding and thorough analysis to serve as input in capacitating our local leaders. With the facilitation and the experience of the Governance and Leadership Institute led by Dr Dixon Yasay, local officials learned that reducing risks in the community can be achieved through strong policies and ordinances.

It is important for the Barangay Disaster Risk Reduction Management Committees (BDRRMCs) to understand their responsibility of managing risks in their communities. Certainly, strengthening the response to hazards such as flooding, landslide and fire requires the active participation of the community.

A few months after Sendong, KKP-SIO, in partnership with the Corporate Network for Disaster Response and Smart Communications assisted in the strengthening of Barangay Macasandig's BDRRMC. The project, which was known as Noah's Ark, lasted for 6 months and involved a series of community workshops that started with hazard analysis and commenced with a community drill participated in by approximately 1,500 residents of Brgy Macasandig. The six-month training was put to test during Super Typhoon Pablo, and the barangay reported no casualties.

The road to capacitating the community is long but people have been very open to learning. KKP-SIO aims to continue capacitating the other highly vulnerable riverside barangays namely, Bonbon, Kauswagan, Balulang, Carmen, Consolacion, Brgy 6, Brgy 7, Brgy 10, Brgy 13, Brgy 15 and Brgy 17.

Meanwhile, there is still much work to do in Cagayan de Oro. There are still families which live in danger zones and we still have Sendong IDPs who have not yet been resettled. We still need to strengthen the Disaster Risk Reduction Management Council of the city. This is a challenge that the city should lead but cannot do alone. Every Kagay-anon has a stake in this endeavor.

# Kalinaw sa Mindanaw XU celebrates Mindanao Week of Peace

embers of the XU community showed their solidarity with Muslims, Lumads and Christians in celebrating the Mindanao Week of Peace from November 29 to December 5. This year's event centered on the theme, "Love of God and Love of Neighbor, A Challenge for Mindanao."

### Taking steps toward peace

KKP volunteers, faculty members and students joined priests, seminarians, and nuns from different congregations, faculty members and students of various academic institutions, military and police officers, civil society groups, non-government organizations and local government officials in the Walk for Peace from the Rodelsa Circle to the Provincial Capitol grounds, which marked the opening of the celebration.

A short program was held where Muslim and Christian leaders, including tribal chieftain Datu Tony Lumandong, Ustadj Amin Macalantong and Archbishop Antonio J Ledesma shared their reflections and hopes for lasting peace in Mindanao following the Bangsamoro Framework Agreement.

The program also paid tribute to the victims of the Maguindanao Massacre in November 2009. Msgr Elmer Abacahin, president of the Cagayan de Oro Press Club, emphasized the significant role of the media in exposing the truth, which is the groundwork of peace. He challenged everyone to live in truth and to think critically about the pressing issues of our society today. Lanao del Sur Assembly woman Samira Gutoc-Tomawis encouraged women to speak out and express their advocacy for solidarity to achieve lasting peace in the region.

# Promoting peace through music

On November 30, KKP student volunteers, together with their

youth counterparts staged "Huni sa Mindanao," an alternative concert for peace, at the XU Main Lane. The concert aimed to forge common understanding and genuine respect for the differences in beliefs and religions among Lumads, Muslims, and Christians. Religious, cultural and contemporary performances were interspersed with speeches from select student leaders representing Mindanao's tripeople.

Hakeem Lomondot, KKP volunteer and president of Siraj, an organization for Muslim students, expressed that conflicts ensue when people forget the meaning of respect. He challenged his fellow youth to reach out and to appreciate one another's differences. "Let's join hands in building this nation through peace, brotherhood and camaraderie," Lomondot urged.

Irish Saway, who gave the Indigenous Peoples' perspective, reminded her fellow youth that, amid the cultural and religious diversity, we share a common identity as Filipinos. This was echoed by Cecille Turrecha, a junior KKP student volunteer. She affirmed that we should all work in solidarity as Muslims, Lumads, and Christians for the betterment of the country. The unity dance, which wrapped up the concert, sent the message that unity is possible in a country with so much diversity.

# Depicting peace through photos

With the Peace & Conflict Journalism Network, an international network of journalists, filmmakers and journalism teachers dedicated to the just reporting of conflict, crisis and war, the Campus Ministries and the Development Communication Department put up a photo exhibit called, "Mindanao Landscapes: The People and the Peace Talks," at the university Peace Park.

The photos showed the struggle of Muslims for selfrealization and the divide this has created, especially between Christians and Muslims. The portraits also followed the development of the peace process in Mindanao, culminating with a photo of the signing of the Bangsamoro Framework Agreement.

# St Francis Xavier: His Life and Some Reflections

n celebration of the Feast of St Francis Xavier, the Office of Mission and Ministry organized a symposium on November 28 at the AV 8 entitled, "St Francis Xavier: His Life and Some Reflections" with Fr Mars P Tan SJ, rector of the Jesuit Community, as the resource person. It was attended by students, faculty, and administrators of the University. The resource speaker presented the various aspects of St Francis Xavier's life (Early Years, Francis as a Priest, Francis' Missions in Asia, Francis' Work in Goa, Francis in Malacca and Moluccas, Francis' Mission in Japan) and shared his own reflections.

### Xavier as a great missionary

Francis Xavier is said to have converted more than 700,000 persons in less than ten years. He inaugurated new missionary enterprises from Hormuz to Japan and the Malay Archipelago, and organized Christian communities wherever he preached. As an effective and practical organizer, he gained friendship and allies among natives and foreigners alike, having been a traveling missionary till the end. Many miracles have been attributed to him.

### Criticisms against Francis Xavier

Some of the criticisms against Francis Xavier are as follows: a) he did not understand oriental religions and attacked competing religions invoking the aid of Inquisition; b) he sanctioned the persecution of Nestorians; c) he converted the government of Goa into a proselytizing agency; and d) he used fear to convert pagans to Christianity.

# Was Francis Xavier zealous or just driven by personal ambition?

Francis Xavier had always been ambitious as a young man in the university, conditioned by his parents to be successful in his worldly endeavors. But in his life as a missionary, he went through hardships and sacrifices tirelessly and unceasingly for the conversion of pagans.

### Was he vain or simply focused?

Francis Xavier was an excessively resultsoriented person and did anything to get what he wanted. Such attribute led him to be more focused on his mission to give glory to God by saving souls. For Francis Xavier, only one thing mattered the most and that was the salvation of souls.

# Was Francis resilient or rigid in his missionary approach?

In his early years as a missionary, Francis may be considered rigid and stubborn. But his own experience also taught him to be resilient to effectively do his mission of saving souls.

### Was he a failure or a success?

Some indicators of failure of Francis Xavier may include: a) little success in Japan; b) failure to reach China; and, c) Japan and China remained largely non-Christian. However, more than the failures of St Francis Xavier is his great contribution in planting the seed of Christianity in Asia. Until the present, there are still on-going missions in various countries, opening greater opportunities for evangelization. The numerous number of Japanese and Chinese martyrs, attributed to the influence of Francis Xavier is also one proof that Francis Xavier made his mark in the noble and spiritual work of saving souls. # XU holds relief mission for Pablo victims

avier University held various missions during the school's Christmas break to help victims of Typhoon Pablo in Compostela Valley, Davao Oriental and Agusan del Sur.

Six faculty members and two students facilitated stress debriefing & medical mission in Barangays Cateel, Bana-ao and Yapsay, Davao Oriental, some of the badly hit areas of Typhoon Pablo.

Houses in the coastal areas were washed out due to the storm surges which reached as high as 5ft and covered the main road. People crawled their way out of their houses to safer ground because the wind was strong that it ripped apart heavy cement houses.

Michael Acenas, Monalisa Pangan and Suzette Valmores of the Campus Ministries Office, Engr Crel Valdehueza of the College of Engineering, Dr Vincent Laguardia and Francis Dale Acenas of the School of Medicine, Laurine Alexis Yonson, a Sociology student, and Victoria Melissa Pulido of Kristohanong Katlingban sa Pagpakabana – Social Involvement Office, together with Balay Mindanao Foundation, Inc, served approximately 600 families who were also given free medical check-up and basic medicines.

Meanwhile, a team of seven counselors went to New Bataan, Compostela Valley and Sta Josefa, Agusan del Sur to conduct psychosocial debriefing for affected children. The Guidance and Counseling Office, represented by Dr Joey Marie Jegonia, Carol Landa, Sean Sasing, Sr Trang Tan, Bro Noel Cantago, Carmelita Judith Guarin and Charito Vocal, partnered with the Ateneo de Davao University's Center for Psychological Extension and Research Services (COPERS) during the mission. "There were some kids who still couldn't speak because of the shock," recalled Dr Joey Marie Jegonia who led the team from XU.

To help the children, as young as less than a year to 13 years old, tell their story, Jegonia's team facilitated role playing games where the children could express themselves through movement. They were also given toys with which they could associate the positive experience of the intervention.

Overall, the GCO helped over a hundred children in New Bataan and over 400 children in Sta Josefa. In addition to the toys, which were donated by a group of medical doctors, Jegonia and her team also handed out school supplies.

To fund their mission, the GCO raised funds and diverted their Christmas party budget to the mission. They also got support from the University President's Office.

"Our direction now is toward putting up more funds not just for clothing and books, but to fund a psychosocial team," shared Jegonia.

The team plans to visit the children again in May for a follow-up session.

Despite the tragedy experienced, the communities remain hopeful that a brighter tomorrow awaits them.

"Because we were able to survive, we should continue living," said Edmer, a 12 year old boy from Brgy Ban-ao. "God still has big plans for us." (With reports from Victoria Melissa Pulido)

- Managed two provincial hospitals in Gingoog and Balingasag where he instituted strategic innovations to address perennial problems. As a result, delivery of healthcare services significantly improved. Admissions and consultations increased by 149% and 164%, respectively, in 2008-2011.
